1. Welcome from the Chair of the RGS-IBG Annual Conference

The conference theme 'The Geographical Imagination' has proved a richly fertile one in British Geography, and is currently highly topical, encompassing creative engagements with a variety of academic disciplines and pressing matters of public engagement too. I am delighted at the enthusiastic response to the theme, in the way the conference has taken shape, in particular how so many research groups in their sessions are exploring the richness of the theme and its many variations, enlarging and enriching the space of the geographical imagination. The conference has attracted a new audience of delegates and speakers, many of whom may not have engaged with a geography conference before, notably the strong artist participation. The conference charts new fields of the geographical imagination and revisits some established territory with fresh vision, exploring unexpected places from innovative perspectives. Papers focus on down to earth matters of fact as well as inspiring flights of fancy, encompassing practice and scholarship, politics and poetics, information and enchantment, the geographies of the economic and environmental imagination as well as the cultural and performative.

The conference theme and more are addressed in the Plenaries and Special Sessions. In 'Writing the Land' on Thursday 1 September Peter Hulme (University of Essex) looks at the ways writers, geographers and artists have imagined the island of Cuba, focussing on the long historical relationship between Cuba and its powerful northern neighbour. Later on Thursday the conference will stage Warplands a new work by Mike Pearson (Professor of Performance Studies, Aberystwyth University) which vividly evokes landscapes at the confluence of the rivers Trent, Ouse and Humber, land made up by warping by letting the silt-laden river flood and settle, and land let go through 'wilding' in a major example of coastline realignment. A viewpoint for these landscapes, an ancient turf labyrinth, forms the figure of the conference logo. On Friday 2 September a panel on 'The Cartographic Imagination' brings together artistic, curatorial, historical and geographical expertise to explore the creative power of maps as media of public engagement. In 'A View from the River' Steven Wainwright (Brunel University) explores the role of the geographical imagination in physical geography, in the writing of river scientist Luna Leopold. Socioeconomic flows are explored by Markus Hesse (University of Luxembourg) in 'Cities and flows', their changes over time and implications for policy and planning. In 'Beyond the Neoliberal Zombieland' Jamie Peck (University of

British Columbia) considers the aftermath of the great recession and financial crisis (the theme of last year's conference) and emergent Latin American notions of 'post-neoliberalism'. Next year's conference chair Chris Philo (University of Glasgow) considers madness, history and geography in 'A Great Space of Murmurings' on the 50th anniversary of Michel Foucault's seminal Historie de la Folie.

I would like to thank the AC2011 team, notably Stephanie Wyse, with Catherine Souch and Georgina Endfield, for their creative contribution to the conference theme and its actualisation as well as for their energy and efficiency in organizing such a complex event. My thanks also go to convenors of the various research group sessions who are, as ever, crucial to making the conference so lively and engaging. The team of RGS-IBG staff and volunteers will welcome you to the Society over the next three days and I'm confident will ensure the conference runs as well as ever. I hope you all enjoy the Conference, leaving enriched and enthusiastic, to return next year to its staging in Edinburgh.

Airport transfers

Security of geography/geography of security

The theme is to explore the many intersections between geography and security: meaning both the security of geography and the geography of security. The idea is to work between an 'inward-looking' concern for the well-being of geographical research, learning, teaching and communication, and an 'outward-looking' concern for how worldly geographies are deeply implicated in achieving or compromising the security of environments, peoples and communities. Attention should be given to ways of securing the subject of geography in the face of educational restructuring at schools and financial restructuring of university teaching and research, as well as set against growing governmental (and even popular) demands to show impact, relevance and applicability. Success in this respect may then depend on demonstrating what a geographical perspective - spanning the sciences through to the humanities - can offer attempts at understanding and countering multiple sources of insecurity (environmental, climatic, economic, 'national', digital, personal). A critical sensibility is needed, however, to ensure that the will to create security, whether for an academic subject or in real-world situations, does not descend into simplistic drawing and policing of boundaries around whatever is to be secured. The invitation to all geographers, physical and human, is to ask challenging questions about matters of geography and security which advance intellectual and practical agendas, addressing issues of major scientific and social significance. while also cultivating the institutional supports upon which our own ability to contribute as a subject necessarily depend.
